Scripture tells an old and rich story. The Bible's vision of the end is woven into its very first threads, rooted not merely in creation but in the eternal counsel of God Himself. Before light pierced the darkness, before Adam opened his eyes in Eden, before sin fractured the world, the Triune God had already purposed a future of glory in His Son — the Lamb slain before the foundation of the world.

All of Scripture is unified around the person and work of Jesus Christ. There is one unfolding plot from Genesis to Revelation. Although there are distinctive subplots, they too feed ultimately into the drama that begins with the eternal counsel of God and culminates with God be all in all.

To study eschatology rightly, then, we must begin not with the future but with the eternal. Our hope is not anchored in the unfolding of temporal events but in the uncreated past — in the mind of God, who ordained a Son-centred plan “before the ages began.” If the end is truly a reflection of the beginning, then the ultimate goal of history must be rooted in an eternal purpose that predates time itself.

Yet when many approach eschatology, the mind instinctively leaps toward the details: timelines, symbols, unfulfilled prophecies, and the dramatic culmination of history. In doing so, we often fall into the trap of *missing the forest for the trees* — becoming so absorbed in individual elements that we lose sight of the vast, majestic design that gives them meaning. This book seeks to reverse that tendency. When we keep the larger picture before us, the smaller details naturally fall into place.
